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A NOTE ON LUBUKUSU

Lubukusu is a Bantu language spoken by the Bukusu people of Western Kenya. It is one of the related languages of the Luhya people, and has around 1.2 million speakers. The language is closely related to the Gisu and Masaaba languages of Eastern Uganda, and is mutually intelligible with both of them. Lubukusu has three main variants: in the Kitale region, in the Webuye and Bungoma region, and in the Kakamega and Lugari region. The origin of the language is not known. Written history indicates that the Bukusu ethnic group is among the groups of Bantu peoples who began to migrate eastwards through Uganda to Kenya, from around the 15th and 16th centuries.
